# 'Lest we forget'

#### PHYSIOTHERAPY CAREERS

Over the past four weeks the PE department have had the pleasure of welcoming Becky Duncan and her team from Physio Practice Cornwall to give our Year 10 students an introduction into a career in Physiotherapy. Becky and Mel gave the students an insight into the role of a physiotherapist, the benefits of physiotherapy and useful pathways to gain work experience and study in this area. Each visit consisted of students participating in a group discussion and in a practical session where they completed a balance test. Students had a great experience and hopefully we have inspired some future physio's!



### **ROSUICK FARM TRIP**

On Monday 13 November a group of Year 13 Geography students visited Rosuick Farm. Students were taken on an extensive tour of the farm, discussing methods of land management and sustainable farming. Methods used by Rosuick Farm supported students critical thinking skills, specifically of surrounding the evaluation methods such as afforestation and carbon capture. This trip enabled students to put their knowledge of topics such as 'Water and Carbon cycles' and 'Population and the Environment' into a local context.

### IMPROVING GENDER BALANCE IN COMPUTER SCIENCE

Computer Science is the fastest-growing STEM subject, and yet, despite its popularity, girls are consistently outnumbered by boys. In 2023, only one in five GCSE Computer Science and 15% of all A-Level Computer Science entries were female in England.

However, at Helston, we are consistently narrowing the gender gap, which has resulted in being recognised by the National Centre for Computing Education as having made significant progress in encouraging girls into Computer Science. This has been achieved through the great work put in by the Computing teachers - not only the changes that have been made to the curriculum over the last four years; including annual challenges such as Bebras, Apps for Good and Tech She Can but also the extra-curricular enrichment offer the team provide outside of lesson time each year.

Helston Community College were one of the first schools in the county to take up the Lego Challenge, in its original form of EEP Robotics Challenge, back in 2018, GCHQ's CyberFirst Girls, Cyber Explorers, Y7 Coding Success and our close working relationship with TECgirls and industry employers.

### HELSTON COMMUNITY COLLEGE WINS AWARD FOR YOUNG CARER SUPPORT

Helston Community College has been given a Silver Award for their work to make sure students don't miss out on an education because they are young carers.

The Young Carers in Schools programme helps primary and secondary schools improve outcomes for young carers

and celebrates good practice through the Young Carers in Schools Award. Young carers are responsible for emotional, practical or physical care for a parent, sibling or other family member who has a physical disability, mental health issue or substance misuse issue. The 2021 Census statistics revealed that there are just over 120,000 young carers in England, but research reveals that this is just the tip of the iceberg. The true figure could be closer to 800,000 young carers in England, equivalent to one in 5 secondary aged school children many of whom are unrecognised and unsupported.

"To achieve their Silver Award Helston Community College has demonstrated that it supports young carers in many ways, including awareness raising with pupils and staff, and by building links within the local community. Young carers are consulted with, and vital information is made available to pupils and families, letting them know where to go for help."

### **Term-Time Holidays**

We are seeing an increased number of students being absent during term-time because of holidays. The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. Please complete the form available on the College website. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

This half term 38 students have been on a holiday during school time equating to 345 sessions or 172.5 days of lost learning.

Students who have had a holiday this half term have an average attendance of 82.2% which places many of them into the Government's Persistently Absent category (students with below 90% attendance). It is a well-known fact that students with poor attendance struggle to reach their potential both socially and academically.

At Helston Community College we consider 'Good' attendance to be 97% and above. A student with between 90% and 97% is considered to be a regular attender.

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act.

Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may result in legal action. Absence not authorised by the school may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court. If found guilty, the parent(s) will receive a criminal conviction.

### **ABSENCE – Important Notices for Parents and Carers**

If your child is absent from College, please can you call the College every day of their absence before 8.30am. Please leave a message with specific detail as to why they are unable to attend. Please can we also ask you to let us know of any medical/orthodontist appointments in advance. This helps unnecessary phone calls being made.

### ¡Buen viaje! Spanish students return to Spain

This term we have been lucky to have 2 Spanish students join us to experience life in an English school and to work on their English language skills. We have really valued having them here and are sad to now be saying Goodbye as they return to their schools in Spain.

I spoke to Maria and Martina and their host partners about their experience here at Helston Community College and this is what they said:

### Why did you decide to come and study in England?

*Maria:* My parents wanted me to learn English and they thought it was a good idea that I came to England. The decision wasn't mine, but now I am really grateful for the opportunity.

**Martina:** My parents asked me several times if I wanted to participate in the experience and in the end I asked them if I could do it this year. I thought it would be a new experience and a chance to learn lots of new things.

#### What similarities and differences have you noticed between our school and your schools in Spain?

**Maria:** My school in Spain is smaller. We don't change room for every lesson unlike here! In Spain, we use our teachers name to talk to them unlike here where you say Sir and Miss. In Spain, all students in my school use iPads in lessons rather than books. In general, our schools are very different!

**Martina:** My school in Spain also has several buildings although I stay in my one classroom; it is the teachers who move! Another difference is you can bring your own lunch to school which we don't do in my school.

### What have you enjoyed the most about the experience?

**Maria:** Meeting new people and making good friendships. Making plans, which I couldn't do in Spain.

*Martina*: Yes, for me too, I have enjoyed meeting new people and visiting new places.

#### Has anything surprised you about Cornwall?

*Maria:* What has surprised me the most is the meals! The meal times are very different and so is the food.

*Martina:* The meal times and routines have surprised me too. I have also been surprised by some of the different expressions used when people speak.

### What do you think you have learned from your term here?

**Maria:** I think I have learnt more English and also how to be without my family and friends for so much time and what it is like to start from scratch in a new country.

*Martina:* I have learnt many things that I didn't know about English, things that have



helped me improve my ability to speak English.

### Would you recommend doing an exchange trip?

**Maria:** Yes, I would recommend an exchange. In the beginning, it was challenging to adapt, but all of a sudden, you find yourself getting used to things and enjoying the experience.

**Martina:** Yes definitely. Although at the start, you miss your family and friends, by the end you have a great time and get to know lots of new people and share different experiences with them.

I then asked our host students Poppy Grosely and Hannah Thomson some questions about their experience:

### What has it been like being a host family?

**Poppy:** It has been a good experience and an opportunity to make new friends.

**Hannah:** It has been challenging but it has been the most enjoyable experience ever! At the beginning, it was strange and difficult because we struggled to communicate very well and I didn't know what she would be like. We are very different people and like different things, especially food and music! However, just getting to know Maria and her Spanish culture has been amazing. Over the course of the 3 months we have clicked so well and she'll be 'mi hermana española' (my Spanish sister) forever.

### What do you think you have learned from the experience?

**Hannah:** I have learned to go for things even if you aren't 100% sure because when I first signed up for this my family and I felt cautious about having an exchange student living with us. Now everyone loves her and we consider her to be part of the family. We have had ups and downs and developed our own friendship groups, but we have developed a strong friendship between us and made lots of good memories during her time here. We have learnt so much Spanish as a family, especially my dad and me. It has been amazing!

**Poppy:** I have learned more Spanish and been able to see lots of cultural differences. During half term, I spent time with the group of Spanish students who are in the region and I also met some of Martina's family. I was in the position where I was the only English speaker, at times and it was challenging but a great experience! It made me realise more about what the Spanish students have been through staying with us.

### Do you plan to visit Spain in the future?

**Poppy:** One day hopefully I will!

**Hannah:** Yes, 100% I am going to go and stay with Maria, meet her friends and family and take in all the lovely warm weather I have heard so much about!

We have really enjoyed having Maria and Martina with us this term and they can be so proud of everything they have achieved in their time here. We are also very grateful to our host families for the warm welcome and support they have given the students. We are hoping to host more Spanish students in the future so will be looking for more host families in the future.

Participating in an exchange is an amazing thing to do, it does take courage, but the opportunities it brings and the confidence it can build, along with language learning opportunities make it all worthwhile. We will be launching our 5 day exchange programme with our partner school IES Fernando de Rojas in Salamanca in May next year for students in Year 9 through to 6th Form. We will be hosting students in October 2024 and our return visit will take place in February 2025. Look out for information coming your way!




### LIBRARY NEWS



### HELSTONIAN NEWS CYBERFIRST GIRLS COMPETITION 2023

The 2023/24 CyberFirst Girls Competition, run by GCHQ's National Cyber Security Centre, saw the largest number of girls taking part since its inception.

3608 teams from over 750 schools participated this . The competition aims to encourage girls aged 12-13 to consider pursuing an interest in technology and introduce them the idea of a career in cyber.

In this year's competition, girls across the country tested their cyber skills in cracking codes, decrypting messages, and solving coding puzzles.

The contest is designed to encourage girls to explore the world of cyber and technology, helping to address the lack of diversity in the UK cyber workforce, where women currently make up just 17%. Chris Ensor, NCSC Deputy Director for Cyber Growth, said: "Congratulations to all the teams who took part in this year's CyberFirst Girls Competition, they've shown some incredible talent, teamwork and dedication. A special mention to the respective winners, whose success is not just a triumph in the competition but a great demonstration of breaking barriers and addressing the need for greater female representation in the cyber security industry. I'd like to thank all the teachers, for the incredible effort they put in to inspire their students and our industry partners for their efforts in making the competition so successful."

The winning teams from each region have been invited to a grand prize winning dinner and celebration day taking place early next year. Although Helston were not regional winners the determination and resilience demonstrated throughout the challenge by all teams were amazing.

The CyberFirst Girls Competition is the NCSC's flagship cyber security contest for schools, which opens annually to girls in Year 8 in England and Wales, S2 in Scotland, and Year 9 in Northern Ireland. Since it launched in 2017, around 70,000 girls have taken part.

The CyberFirst programme offers a range of free opportunities aimed at offering young people the skills, opportunities and exposure they need to thrive in cyber security. This is aimed at boosting pupils' learning journey as well as supporting the wider drive to close the digital skills gap. 
