Dear Parents, Carers, Students and Friends of the College

Another term passes by and Easter is on the horizon. The students, as always, were fabulous, in what has been a really busy but productive 12 weeks. The big event of the term was our college production of James and the Giant Peach - a truly whole college affair with so many students and staff involved. It was wonderful to see such a mix of students from Year 7 through to Year 13 taking part. It was a brilliant and fun production. A huge amount of time and energy has to go into making these events possible and we are truly grateful to everyone involved.

We have now had a full term of using iPads in school for students in Years 7 to 11. It has started really well with lots of great practice seen across the college. By September 2026, all schools will need to have plans to expand students' work experience hours, providing opportunities in Years 7, 8 and 9 as well as in Years 10 and 12. We are keen to get ahead of the game and start building more links with local businesses, no matter how big or small. The work experiences for younger students won't be week-long placements like they are in Year 10 or 12, but will involve workplace visits or meaningful encounters with employers in school. In addition, we would also like to build up our alumni and share with our current students some of the great careers former HCC students are now working in. Please see the next page to sign up!

Thank you again for your continued support. The feedback we receive from you is overwhelmingly positive and the college feels like it is going from strength to strength. Our students in Years 11 and 13 are working hard in preparation for the upcoming exams and their predicted grades look really promising. ## **ARTS LAB PROJECT - PUPPETRY - JANUARY 2025**

We were thrilled to welcome artists from Brave Biscuits studio to run puppetry workshops with our Year 7 Nurture class in The Bridge. Over the course of four sessions during dull January days, our students' lives were enlivened by exploring the world of making and playing with puppets.

During the first session, students had the opportunity to construct puppets out of brown paper and gaffer tape; puppets which came to life and played football and tended to their tiny paper baby. The following week ping pong balls and animal print fabrics were transformed into characterful glove puppets with googly eyes and fluffy bodies. Much hilarity ensued.

Students were introduced to another form of puppetry during the next session – they made rod puppets clothed in colourful fabrics, whose arms and hands expressively shared stories and captivated hearts. Some students unleashed the tidal wave of their creativity; writing scripts, choosing music, adapting lyrics, designing and making a puppet booth complete with scenery, beautifully made curtains and carefully crafted props. The project culminated in a performance piece which they all enjoyed sharing. And the playing continues as all students took their puppets home.

Never underestimate the power of play. As Albert Einstein famously said 'Play is the highest form of research'. One of our students, who often finds school challenging said 'this has been the best thing in school ever'. Thank you Brave Biscuits for sharing your wonderful world of puppets.




# James and the Giant Peach

Under Mrs Hocking's leadership, our school has developed an engaging and forward-thinking Computer Science curriculum, offering students exciting opportunities to build essential digital skills.

Achieving such a high Silver status, as the only school in Cornwall to do so, is a remarkable achievement. It reflects

## Film and TV Editor gives careers inspiration to Media Studies students



During February, our Year 10 GCSE Media Studies' students received a visit in their lesson from Chloe Kilbv. who works as a freelance film and television editor. Chloe is one of our alumni (former students). and in her talk she

communicated her experiences of working in the TV and Film industry as a creative career. Students enjoyed hearing about Chloe's route into university, which began in 2008 in Year 10 when she chose to study Media Studies and Film Studies GCSEs, then later at A Levels, at HCC. Her other A Levels were in Photography and Art. Chloe then successfully applied for a prestigious place studying Film Production at Bournemouth

Arts University, one of the top places in the UK

to study for a creative career. She shared a clip with us from the big budget Alex Ryder TV series which she had recently worked on as an editor. Chloe also spoke to students about her experience of having photosensitive epileptic seizures at school, and how this had helped shape her subject choices, but also made working in Edit Suites difficult at times. She spoke about how persevering through some of the challenges it had presented her with at school later paid off, when her additional needs helped her to secure her first job on graduating with Channel 4. This involved working on Paralympic footage from the games in Rio to ensure it was compliant with rules broadcasters have to follow for people who experience seizures. She later progressed to a range of TV fiction and documentary projects with the channel before going freelance.

To date, Chloe has worked as a freelance Editor and Assistant Editor on a really varied range of TV and film projects. She was even happy to tell students (when they cheekily enquired!) what

she earns a week for different types of project, which some of them were quite surprised by. She also talked about how she has to manage her finances as a freelance creative professional and introduced students to the realities of managing your own income, holidays and tax affairs!

It was lovely to see a former student talking with such passion and enthusiasm about their journey into a career they love.


They received a trophy and won £150 prize money for the club. They really did us proud.



#### YOUNG AMBASSADOR INSPIRATION EVENT - YEAR 9



Prior to half term the College hosted an Apprenticeship Expo event in the Post 16 Building. Students in Years 11, 12 & 13 and their parents/ carers were able to visit the exhibition and discuss apprenticeship options with the presenters from a wide range of local and national providers. This provided a valuable insight into the range of career options available to the students and enabled students to become better informed about apprenticeships and the benefits linked with this career route. To maximise the chance to share apprenticeship information guest presenters from ASK (Apprenticeships, Skills and Knowledge), on behalf of Cornwall Council, were invited to Helston for the day to provide additional facts and activities linked with apprenticeships. 

## **UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE FROM COLLEGE**

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend Court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the Government. 'Parent' as set out in Section 576 of the Education

Act 1996, defines parent to include: natural parents, whether they are married or not; any

person or body who has parental responsibility for a child (as defined by the Children Act 1989) and; any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child. Having care of a child means a person with whom a child lives and who looks after a child, irrespective of what their relationship is with said child.

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you consider that your request for absence is exceptional, please complete the form on the College website.
