There are many students featured in the magazine. If you see someone you know in a photo or read their names, please congratulate them and celebrate their contributions and successes.



It has been wonderful to see how our teachers and students have utilised the iPads and apps since their recent introduction across the whole school. Many lessons now feature the iPads in some way, whether that be using the



Socrative app to test students' understanding, the Showbie app to provide resources for the lessons and homework, or taking photos of student work to upload. iPads, as you may be aware, also have a range of accessibility features to help students access their work and the teaching resources better. 

County Swimming Championships Successes 2025!

For the past four weekends Helston College students have been competing in the 2025 Cornwall County Swimming Championships representing both the Carn Brea Helston and Penzance swim clubs.

Members of Carn Brea Helston:

Erin (Year 7), Raya, Evelyn (Year 8) and Hal (Year 8) all competed in heats and the following students made the finals:

Archie -Year 8 - 100m breaststroke

Jude - Year 8 - 50 and 100 backstroke

Isabelle - Year 7 - 100m individual medley, 50 butterfly and came home with three backstroke medals - 1st for 200m, 1st for 100m and, 3rd for 50m

Agnes - Year 8 - 50 breastroke, 100 IM, 50 Fly, 50 Free, 50 Back and came home with medals 2nd for 200 Back and 6th in Juniors and 3rd for 100 Back.

Elsie - Year 11 - came home with seven medals including 3rd for 800m Free, 5th overall senior, 3rd for 50 Fly and 2nd for 100 Fly

Chloe - Year 11 - came home with the overall Kernow award for age group and an amazing 17 medals including: 1st for 800 freestyle and 1st Senior, 2nd for 200 freestyle and 2nd Senior, 1st for 100 IM and 1st Senior. 1st for 50 Fly. 1st for 200 backstroke and 1st Senior. 3rd for 100 freestyle and 6th Senior. 1st for 100 Back. 1st for 200 IM. 1st for 50 backstroke and 3rd Senior. 1st for 100 butterfly and 3rd Senior.

Lucy - Year 12 - made the finals for 100m breastroke and came home with 3rd for 200m freestyle and 6th overall senior.

Darcey - Year 13 - came home with 1st for 1500 freestyle and 1st Senior, 6th Senior for 50m backstroke and 3rd for 100 butterfly and 4th Senior.

Cassie - Year 13 - came home with 6th Senior in 1500 freestyle.

Tom -Year 13 - made the finals for 50 Fly and came home with 5th Senior in 100 Free.

Members of Penzance swimming club:

Maya - Year 10 - swam incredible 1500m and 800m races (a total of 92 lengths!)

Hugo - Year 7 - gained two regional times in breaststroke and butterfly, as well as a medal in 200m individual medley

Brad - Year 7 - came 1st in the 1500m, 2nd in the 200m backstroke, as well as competed in an 800m, 400m, 3 different 200m races and gained 2nd in the 100m backstroke (a total of 136 lengths!)

A fantastic achievement for all involved, keeping HCC students at the forefront of Cornish competitive swimming.







Ctrl Alt Del Conversations: Innovating for Inclusion

On Thursday 6 February, we had an inspiring day hosting the Ctrl Alt Del Conversations workshop for all Year 9 students, delivered by TecWomen CIC and their external partners! Year 9 students used their Business, STEM, Design Tech, and Creative knowledge in an interactive, thought-provoking day.

They explored the power of inclusive innovation and its role in creating a more diverse, equitable world. Students:

- Learned about gender gaps, pay inequality, and the lack of representation in emerging technologies like Al.
- Discovered how diverse teams lead to better innovation.
- Worked in groups to design their own inclusive product ideas and pitched them to the class!

The winning ideas received some sweet prizes! It was inspiring to watch the students embrace the challenges around discrimination and

take on the role of innovators by coming up with their own solutions. Their enthusiasm and creativity were evident throughout the day, and seeing them present their ideas at the end was nothing short of brilliant.

One student told me it was the fastest two hours she has ever spent in school – she enjoyed it so much!

The presentations really highlighted the potential some of our students have. It was clear that we may be looking at future founders, entrepreneurs, and politicians in the making!

The team from TecWomen CIC and their external partners shared how impressed they were with our students who were engaged, had a great breadth of knowledge, understanding and empathy around discrimination.

UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE FROM COLLEGE

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend Court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the Government.

'Parent' as set out in Section 576 of the Education Act 1996, defines parent to include: natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person or body who has parental responsibility for a child (as defined by the Children Act 1989) and; any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child. Having care of a child means a person with whom a child lives and who looks after a child, irrespective of what their relationship is with said child.

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you consider that your request for absence is exceptional, please complete the form on the College website.

A response from the school will be sent to you as soon as possible. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.
