NEW CATERERS AND A FULLY CASHLESS SYSTEM

Due to the retirement of our Catering Manager, we have decided to outsource our catering to Aspens. Aspens currently work across a number of Trust schools and we have received very positive feedback about their food and service. We have an exciting new menu with a variety of meal deals to choose from. Please be aware that we will be a cashless school from September, so all payments for the canteen must be via ParentPay. This will commence from the first day back in September (for Years 8 to13) and from the second day back for Year 7 (due to ParentPay details not being issued until the first day back).

MOBILE PHONES

We've made a couple of small changes to our mobile phone policy. This a Trust-wide change, so it is the same across all our secondary schools. The changes are:

- a. If a student needs to leave the classroom, e.g. to use the toilet, they must hand their phone into the teacher before they leave the room. This is to prevent students from leaving lessons to simply check their phones.
- b. If a student is seen on their phone without permission and has their phone confiscated more than once in a half-term, then a parent will need to come in to collect the phone. If a parent is unable to collect the phone, the phone will be returned to the student at the end of the following school day. This is to help deter students from using their phones in school.







On Friday 11th July, our school community came together for an incredible challenge in support of the RNLI – and the results were outstanding!



CUSTOMER SERVICE EXCELLENCE

On Wednesday 2 July, our Post-16 Business students visited Tesco Helston as part of their Level 3 Unit 14 Customer Service studies. The visit offered a unique opportunity to see how one of the UK's largest retailers delivers and monitors customer service in a real-world setting. The visit began with a guided tour led by Julie Lawrence, who introduced students to Tesco's customer service strategies and innovations. She explained how Tesco uses the Medallia app to gather real-time customer feedback, helping the store track satisfaction and identify areas for improvement. This directly supports the unit's focus on monitoring and evaluating customer service performance.

Julie also highlighted Tesco's Clubcard loyalty scheme, which offers customers savings, vouchers, and partner bonuses—demonstrating how businesses use incentives to build loyalty and meet customer expectations.

Students explored the variety of shopping options available, including:

- Scan-as-you-shop
- Basket-only and trolley-only self-service tills
- Personal shopping by staff
- Click & Collect and home delivery via Tesco.com

They also learned about Tesco's in-store partnerships with brands like Timpsons, Costa, Yo! Sushi, and Vision Express, as well as seasonal offerings and the "Free From" range. These services reflect Tesco's commitment to convenience, inclusivity, and customer choice.

Later in the visit, Nick Mills, Store Manager, met with the group to discuss how Tesco monitors service quality and addresses customer perceptions. He explained how the store uses customer recommendation scores and feedback data to challenge the misconception that large retailers compromise on quality. Nick emphasized that Tesco is actively working to improve the perception of freshness and service quality, particularly through initiatives like:

- Sustainable bakery options
- Improved store layout for better visibility and appeal
- Fresh Care training for staff
- Cleanliness and safety standards, including deep cleaning and secure storage for high-value items

To bring the learning to life, students took part in a taste test of Tesco's blueberries and strawberries, comparing freshness and flavour—an engaging way to explore how product quality influences customer satisfaction.

To top off the visit, Nick kindly presented each student with a Tesco goodie bag, leaving them with a positive and memorable experience of customer service in action.

This visit gave students valuable insights into:

- Different approaches to customer service
- Meeting customer expectations
- Legal and ethical responsibilities
- Monitoring and improving service delivery

INSPIRING INSIGHTS INTO CUSTOMER SERVICE: NICOLA BURGESS VISITS POST-16 BUSINESS STUDENTS

On Tuesday 12 June, students on the Post-16 Business course were treated to an engaging and insightful session with Nicola Burgess from Newells Travel, Helston. Nicola visited the class to share her expertise on customer service; an essential topic the students are currently exploring as part of their Level 3 Business qualification.

Nicola began by introducing the concept of customer service and how it varies across different types of businesses she had worked in. She highlighted the contrasting approaches between high street travel agencies like Newells Travel and online-only competitors, sparking a lively discussion among students about the value of personal interaction and tailored service.

The talk also covered vital interpersonal skills, such as active listening, empathy, and clear communication—skills that Nicola emphasized as crucial for building trust and loyalty with customers. Students were particularly interested in how Newells Travel maintains strong customer relationships through both face-to-face and digital channels. As part of the session, Nicola explored how businesses can meet customer expectations while adhering to key legislation, including the Data Protection Act, Consumer Protection laws, and the Sale of Goods Act. She shared real-world examples of how Newells Travel ensures compliance and handles customer complaints with professionalism and care.

Students also gained valuable insights into how businesses monitor and improve their customer service. Nicola discussed the use of customer feedback, surveys, and even mystery shoppers to evaluate performance and drive continuous improvement.

The visit concluded with a Q&A session, where students asked thoughtful questions about ethical standards, equal opportunities, and the impact of excellent customer service on business success.

HELSTON HELP FOR DEVON AND CORNWALL FOOD ACTION



On 26 June, a number of students from HCC (as well as a few from other local schools), travelled to Plymouth to visit the headquarters of Devon and Cornwall Food Action (DCFA). DCFA are a registered charity whose mission is tackle food insecurity, as well as reducing food waste.

They work with partners in the food industry, including producers and supermarkets, to rescue surplus food that would otherwise end up in landfills. It's not just about preventing waste—it's about making sure perfectly good food reaches those who need it most. They team up with local organisations (such as HCC) to ensure that the food we save gets to the people who need it most. It's all about community effort and making sure that everyone has enough to eat.

Whether it's through their Plymouth Hub or at pop-up event, such as the monthly pop-up at HCC, they're there to provide essential food items directly to individuals and families facing hardship. No referrals are needed, but they do ask that you pre-order and bring your shopping bags. DCFA have been working in partnership with HCC since September 2023 and together, we have supported over 1000 families in the Helston Area. Every month, students and staff volunteer on a Saturday morning, welcoming local families to our North Site between 1000 and 1100. For just £30 DFCA provide a week's worth of shopping.

This includes:

- Tea/coffee
- Pasta/rice
- Selection of tins & cereal
- Bag/box of crips
- Box of pasties/pies
- Bag of frozen items
- Bag of fresh fruit/veg
- Bag of household toiletries
- Bread/rolls/cakes
- Pet food
- (And often more)



At DCFA's hub in Plymouth, we learned more about work that goes on behind the scenes, to make their pop-up events possible. We learned that just keeping the charity running (warehouse rental, electricity bills, etc. costs £15,000 per month! They have 70 volunteers who give up their time to help, but Alan Dunne (Chairman) says he really needs 180!

These volunteers give up their time for no payment and the charity works every single day of the year except Christmas Day.

While the focus of the charity is very much about tackling food insecurity, it is also good for the environment. Food that would have been wasted goes to those who need it most and if any fresh produce perished, it is processed to make biofuel.

When we visited, students learned lots about how big organisations work, including supply chains and health & safety requirements. We also then got down to work – helping to package groceries, re-label products that had lost theirs and allocate products for upcoming pop-up events. We also got speak to a range of people working for the charity. When Year 7 student, Michael, interviewed Alan Dunne (Chairman) and asked him the one thing that he wanted most for the charity, Alan said "For it not to be needed". Alan explained that food insecurity was a growing problem – in 2022/23 7.2 million people faced food insecurity (an increase of 2.5. million from the year before). Alan explained that 82% of the people they support are in working households and that food insecurity is affecting people who are in employment more and more.

We are very proud of our partnership with DCFA and the help that it provides to the Helston community. Space Camp 2025

The trip was fully funded by Northrop Grumman (an American Aerospace Company) and was set up to take students from the JET project to experience Astronaut Training.

Domas and Kitt stayed in dorms with students from all over the world and took part inactivities such as:

The Multi-Axis Trainer (MAT) which simulates disorientation from in space, and the 1/6 Chair which simulates walking on the moon.

They also crewed simulated missions to the moon.

Mrs Mullins and I also took part in Space Camp for Educators where we took part in all the same activities and experienced a life changing week.

The boys grew in confidence throughout the week and we have never had so much fun.

We look forward to implementing some of the more land based activities back in school!

















'During Activities Week, some of our students took part in a Podcasting Academy. Over three days, they learnt technical skills for recording their podcasts, including generating their own original Foley SFX and location and studio recording. They learnt how to edit sound successfully, and recorded and edited a fictional podcast drama about three students who run a school podcast.

They also dipped into branding strategies, learning about sonic branding as well as how to write show notes and create a thumbnail in Photoshop to market their creations.

Along the way, they clocked up 18 of the Guided Learning Hours towards the RSL Grade 3 in Digital Communications, and will be continuing their studies via distance learning and check-ins next term ready to take their exam in October.

They all worked phenomenally hard and should be very proud of the edits they produced.

UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE FROM COLLEGE

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period.

Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting

order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend Court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the Government.

'Parent' as set out in Section 576 of the Education Act 1996, defines

parent to include: natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person or body who has parental responsibility for a child (as defined by the Children Act 1989) and; any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child. Having care of a child means a person with whom a child lives and who looks after a child, irrespective of what their relationship is with said child.

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you consider that your request for absence is exceptional, please complete the form on the College website.

A response from the school will be sent to you as soon as possible. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.



I know you have had a number of messages about the importance of attendance over the academic year. However, we just want to reiterate what the impact of being in school every day has on students. The data is really clear - students with high attendance (95%+) on average achieve more than those with low attendance. This is not just the case with assessments and exams, but also in respect of the wider aspects of school life, such as developing social skills and friendships; being involved in leadership roles or extra-curricular activities.

We do, of course, understand that everyone gets ill at times, but when illness is minor, we do expect students to be resilient and make every effort to come in. If they are too unwell to remain in school, they can be sent home. Being resilient is an important part of growing up and an important part of life generally. Please do support us in trying to develop this in the students.

As you know, we are unable to authorise term-time holidays. We can do so in exceptional circumstances; however these really are very rare. The direction and guidance from the government is very clear so please be prepared to receive a penalty notice should you choose to take your child out of school during term.

We run a tiered approach to supporting students' attendance. If attendance starts to become a concern, the student will be placed at tier 1 and you will be notified in writing. This is a supportive measure to see if there is anything we can do to improve the situation. However, should the attendance continue to decline, then a student will be placed on tier 2, where a Pupil Support Plan will be drawn up in collaboration with parents/carers. If all support options have been exhausted and are not successful, then the Education Welfare Officer will take on the case.

We know that every situation is different and there are genuine reasons for absence. We really do want to work with families to help when attendance declines. Please take this as it is meant - we simply want to work together with you to ensure the students in our care get the best out of school, by being in as much as possible.




Step 1: Sign in to Office.com


