As you know, good attendance to school makes a huge difference to students' achievements. Recent data from the Department for Education shows that students with 95% attendance or higher (approximately 3 days absence each term) are twice as **likely** to achieve a strong pass in their English and Maths GCSEs compared to those with less than 90% attendance (approximately 6 days of absence each term).

School Streaks Success!

Our launch of School Streaks has been a real success with almost 700 students managing to complete their 5 streaks and claim a reward! Students have chosen rewards such as attending a silent disco, free stationery, shopping vouchers, prom tickets, skip the queue lunch passes and surprisingly, very popular, tea with the Head!

If you're not yet in the know about School Streaks here's the lowdown...

School Streaks is a piece of software that monitors students' attendance and behaviour to enable students to build up streaks and be rewarded for being in school and working hard. Once students have a certain number of streaks they can select their very own reward. Students will be able to monitor their streaks through an app on their iPads. Other schools who have trialed the software have reported increased motivation and consistency in students.

The school has the power to set its own streaks. For example, 1 streak could be achieved for 5 straight days of attendance with no behaviour points. And a reward could be given for all those achieving 5 streaks in a half-term. One of the great things about School Streaks is that if a streak is broken it resets the next day - it doesn't just work from Monday to Friday. Students can personalise their app on their iPad and use it to see how many days they need to complete a streak as well as using it to choose their reward.










Learning About Parenthood: Egg & Flour Baby Projects

Over the past few weeks, our students have been taking part in creative projects designed to help them understand the challenges and responsibilities of parenthood.

Year 10 - The Egg Baby Project

Year 10 students were each given an "egg baby" to care for over the course of a week. Their task was to treat the egg as if it were a real child — keeping it safe, transporting it carefully, and ensuring it was never left unattended. The project encouraged students to think about the constant attention and responsibility that parenting requires. Many students decorated their eggs, gave them names, and even created protective carriers to keep them safe.

Year 12 - The Flour Baby Project

Meanwhile, Year 12 students took on the slightly heavier challenge of the "flour baby." Each student was responsible for a bag of flour, treated as their baby, for a week.

This project required even more planning and commitment, as the flour babies were larger, harder to carry, and more difficult to keep intact. Students quickly realised the importance of organisation, patience, and care when balancing their studies with the responsibility of looking after their flour baby.

Lessons Learned

Both projects gave students valuable insight into the realities of parental responsibility. They learned that parenting involves constant vigilance, problem solving, and emotional investment. The activities sparked thoughtful discussions about the demands of caring for a child, the importance of support networks, and the skills needed to balance responsibilities.

These projects were not only fun and engaging but also deeply educational, helping our students to reflect on the challenges of parenthood in a safe and creative way.

25 Year 9 students visited London on the 10th and 11th November. The main purpose of the trip was to visit Parliament to gain a better understanding of the democratic process in the UK and how this fits in with British values today. Departing Helston in the early hours of the morning, we arrived at the Imperial War Museum ready for action. Highlights of this part of the trip included looking at World War Two weaponry and how Britain responded to the Blitz - students were able to see some of the consequences of when democracy fails and is replaced by a dictatorship. The group then gained a bird's eye view of London from the Eye and, despite the slightly damp weather, were able to see landmarks such as the Shard, St Paul's Cathedral and the BT Tower. We then made our way to YHA St Paul's via the Tate Modern Turbine Hall and the Millenium Bridge. In the evening the group were treated to song and dance at the Theatre Royal watching a performance of Hercules. The 11th November started with our visit Parliament and we were able to

sit in the House of Lords and even meet a member – though there were no signs of him leaping.



This was followed by a workshop where students developed their own draft legislation. This was definitely the highlight of the trip as the students were articulate and thoughtful and credit to themselves and the school. Our trip ended with a visit to the National Portrait Gallery and a walking tour which included the Cenotaph, bedecked with poppies for Remembrance Day; Horse Guards Parade; Trafalgar Square and Buckingham Palace where we were serenaded by the Band of the Welsh Guards playing 'All Through the Night.' Well done to all the students who took part and many thanks to Ms Creaser, Ms Breasley and Mr Williams.




YEAR 10 GCSE ART

This term, Year 10 GCSE Art students have been exploring the theme of Power and Conflict through research and creative responses to the work of artist Mark Powell.








Some students were fortunate to view original pieces by Kehinde Wiley during the recent Art London trip, providing a unique opportunity to experience his work first hand.

Careers Tour

Engaging and Inspirational BBC Bitesize Careers Tour visit to Helston

Helston had the honour of hosting the BBC Bitesize Careers tour on Friday 5 December. The tour aims to present to over 110,000 students in a three month period in schools across the length and breadth of the UK with Helston being one of only four Cornish colleges to be selected to take part this year.

Students in Years 7-10 were treated to interactive sessions which were hosted by the engaging and enthusiastic BBC Radio One and CBBC presenter Kathryn B. Wilson. The sessions featured the following guest panellists: Emily Cunningham MBE, a Marine Biologist from Falmouth; Victoria Gould, a Senior Content Producer from BBC Radio Cornwall; and Alex Bunn, a Cyber Security Technician from north Devon who works for Lineal. Each session featured questions posed by Kathryn to the panellists regarding their career pathways, their school life and training routes, the importance of 'soft skills' such as speaking and listening, and advice they had for students with regards managing stress and pursuing their goals. There were also opportunities for students to get involved, for example in each session a selected student was able to take part in a technician jobs survey, which can be found on the BBC Bitesize website, in front of the audience. In addition, students had the chance to ask the panellists questions through a soft microphone shaped like a rugby ball which the students were able to pass around the hall. Many stayed back after the sessions had finished to ask additional questions to our guests.

It was a wonderful, positive experience for Helston students, which enabled them to take away valuable pieces of information that could help shape their outlook on their future studies and career pathways.

Ask the Experts events at Helston Community College

A new series of careers events have been launched this year which provide students in Years 10-13 the chance to take part in short, focused, question and answer sessions with guests from within specific industry sectors. The Ask the Experts programme enables students to get answers and tips towards achieving their goals. These sessions feature small groups of students which ensures those present are keen and with a particular interest in the information being shared. The Ask the Experts events take place in our Post 16 Centre between 1.45pm and 2.15pm. In November, Commander Turrell from Culdrose came to the college and met with students with a keen interest in finding out information towards careers in the Royal Navy. This was followed in early December by Cprl Alex Simpson from the recruitment office in Redruth who shared his knowledge with students regarding pathways towards careers in the British Army.

Welcome to Xello!

All students in Years 7-11 have been introduced to Xello; a careers platform for students to explore future career options/



opportunities. Xello features a series of surveys for students to complete to help them to see which careers suit their skills, interests, characteristics and learning styles. Careers lessons which are taught through the PSHE programme also use Xello, and students can use it to search for further and higher education courses and training routes across the country. Xello can also be used to help create a CV, which builds upon all the careers related experiences which feature across a student's life spent at Helston Community College. Parents and carers are encouraged to speak to the students about Xello. Later this year it is likely that parents/ carers will also be able to view the Xello profiles of their students.

Careers Assemblies this term

Students in Years 7-11 have attended a variety of careers assemblies during the term. These included Commander Turrell from Culdrose, representing Royal Navy, who helped inspire students by discussing his career and ensuring all students were made aware of the option available to gain entry into Royal Navy. In late November, Rebecca Langston from Sealife Trust (Seal Sanctuary) presented an insight into careers in animal care and tourism and also made students aware of the popularity of work placements at the Sealife Trust. Steve Hancock from Pendennis Shipyard recently delivered assemblies to students in Years 10 & 11 sharing knowledge about apprenticeships and the career pathways that apprentice's usually follow within the company. There are more careers assemblies scheduled for Easter term, including guests from Falmouth University speaking to all year groups.

Year 10 Work Experience: 20th-24th July 2026

Students in Years 10 & 12 have been tasked with sourcing their own work experience placement for 20th-24th July 2026. Students were encouraged to get a placement confirmed by Friday 5 December. Whilst the first deadline has passed, it is hoped that remaining students will get their paperwork completed as soon as possible.

Stacey Woodruff from NHS is attending Helston Community College to deliver a series of careers talks about Diagnostic Radiography & Pathology and organising work experience within the local imaging service. These talks will be aimed at Year 11 and Post 16 students.

Tuesday 13 January - Careers Carousel.

Students in Year 9 will take part in a careers carousel during period 3 or period 4 which will involve the chance to ask questions and write down answers about how their interests, skills and characteristics would be best suited in a range of workplaces and training providers. This is aimed at helping the students with providing guidance ahead of selecting their option subjects for their KS4 GCSE studies. Between 4.00pm and 5.45pm students in Years 9-11 will be able to attend the careers fair to ask questions of all training providers and businesses regarding their future careers ideas.

Monday 19 January - 'Ask the Experts: Hospitality'.

An opportunity for students in Years 10-13 to find out about Hospitality-related careers from guest speaker, Terri Felton-Munday. This will take place in the Post 16 Centre starting at 1.45pm.

Thursday 29 January - Apprenticeship Expo event for Year 11 and Post 16 students.

This will be hosted in the Post 16 Building with Year 11 students able to meet the apprenticeship providers during their period 4 lesson. After college Year 11s and Post 16 students can attend with parents/carers. 1.45pm - 5.00pm

Monday 2 February - 'Ask the Experts: Law'.

An opportunity for students in Years 10-13 to find out about Law-related careers from guest speaker, Chris Morse of Stephens Scown. This will take place in the Post 16 Centre starting at 1.45pm.

We started slowly, adapting to weather conditions and the early morning start! We had to wake up and re-focus ready for our next games.



History Club Builds Mini Medieval Castles



Oxbridge - P16 Pathway

The newly restructured high achiever's pathway started this term and now includes Year 10 students. The pathway has been running with year 11, 12 and 13 students for a number of years with the students meeting weekly with Dr Ryan (KS4 students) and Ms Doolin (KS5 students).

The programme is supported by Oxford University and each year the students attend workshops in Oxford about critical thinking and applying to university.

The Year 12 trip to Oxford in November included insightful workshops about writing personal statements, whilst the year 10 residential visit last week focussed on critical thinking skills and applying the skills to physics,

law, geography, and English. Each trip also includes visits to the world-famous Bodleian library or the natural history museum in Oxford. We interviewed him to find out what has motivated him to support the College for so long...

1. What made you decide to become a Governor in the first place?


I was approached when the College had lost a Governor with a financial background. As a chartered accountant I felt that I could make a positive contribution to the College.

2. Can you tell us exactly what a Governor does?

The role of a Governor has changed substantially in the forty years during which I have been a Governor. When I first became a Governor the Governing Body had a substantial part to play in the operation of the College.

There were two sub-committees, one being "Teaching and Learning" and the other "Finance". For obvious reasons I was chairman of the Finance Sub-committee. Our role has gradually changed over the ensuing years and now, although we are described as a critical friend, our involvement in the operation of the College is reduced.

We've even had a name change and we are now called the Local Monitoring Committee.



The thing which makes me most proud of the College is the care for the wellbeing of all students. While academic excellence is a goal of the College, they do not lose sight of the fact that each student is a human being with differing needs.

4. How much has the College changed in 40 years?


The College today is almost unrecognisable from the College when I became a Governor. Firstly, the north site building of forty

years ago has been demolished and replaced by a new build. Secondly, the technology involved in teaching has been totally transformed; whiteboards, tablets and computer rooms were unheard of in 1985.

However, one thing which has changed very little is the south site, the main building of which has changed very little since I was at what was then known as the grammar school in the 1960's.

5. Do you have any funny stories about your time as a Governor?

I attended the school Sports Day earlier this year as a Governor wearing my lanyard. Because parents and guardians don't attend there were very few adults not known to the students. I noticed a group of children looking at me and having a discussion. Eventually one was delegated to approach me and asked "Excuse me but who are you?" My explanation appeared to satisfy them that I was not a random stranger and a threat to their safety!!





UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE FROM COLLEGE

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period.

Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting

order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend Court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the Government.

'Parent' as set out in Section 576 of the Education Act 1996, defines

parent to include: natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person or body who has parental responsibility for a child (as defined by the Children Act 1989) and; any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child. Having care of a child means a person with whom a child lives and who looks after a child, irrespective of what their relationship is with said child.

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you consider that your request for absence is exceptional, please complete the form on the College website.

A response from the school will be sent to you as soon as possible. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.



I know you have had a number of messages about the importance of attendance over the academic year. However, we just want to reiterate what the impact of being in school every day has on students. The data is really clear - students with high attendance (95%+) on average achieve more than those with low attendance. This is not just the case with assessments and exams, but also in respect of the wider aspects of school life, such as developing social skills and friendships; being involved in leadership roles or extra-curricular activities.

We do, of course, understand that everyone gets ill at times, but when illness is minor, we do expect students to be resilient and make every effort to come in. If they are too unwell to remain in school, they can be sent home. Being resilient is an important part of growing up and an important part of life generally. Please do support us in trying to develop this in the students.

As you know, we are unable to authorise term-time holidays. We can do so in exceptional circumstances; however these really are very rare. The direction and guidance from the government is very clear so please be prepared to receive a penalty notice should you choose to take your child out of school during term.

We run a tiered approach to supporting students' attendance. If attendance starts to become a concern, the student will be placed at tier 1 and you will be notified in writing. This is a supportive measure to see if there is anything we can do to improve the situation. However, should the attendance continue to decline, then a student will be placed on tier 2, where a Pupil Support Plan will be drawn up in collaboration with parents/carers. If all support options have been exhausted and are not successful, then the Education Welfare Officer will take on the case.

We know that every situation is different and there are genuine reasons for absence. We really do want to work with families to help when attendance declines. Please take this as it is meant - we simply want to work together with you to ensure the students in our care get the best out of school, by being in as much as possible.
