School Streaks Success!

School Streaks continues to motivate and enthuse the students with almost 800 students managing to complete their streaks and claim a reward this term. Students have chosen rewards such as attending a silent disco, free stationery, shopping vouchers, prom tickets, skip the queue lunch passes and surprisingly, very popular, tea with the Head!

If you're not yet in the know about School Streaks here's the lowdown...

School Streaks is a piece of software that monitors students' attendance and behaviour to enable students to build up streaks and be rewarded for being in school and working hard. Once students have a certain number of streaks they can select their very own reward. Students will be able to monitor their streaks through an app on their iPads. Other schools who have trialed the software have reported increased motivation and consistency in students.

The school has the power to set its own streaks. For example, 1 streak could be achieved for 5 straight days of attendance with no behaviour points. And a reward could be given for all those achieving 5 streaks in a half-term. One of the great things about School Streaks is that if a streak is broken it resets the next day - it doesn't just work from Monday to Friday. Students can personalise their app on their iPad and use it to see how many days they need to complete a streak as well as using it to choose their reward.

Coming soon - your next Streak Challenge...

We are really excited about the next round of streaks after Christmas and will be launching the reward options when we return in January.

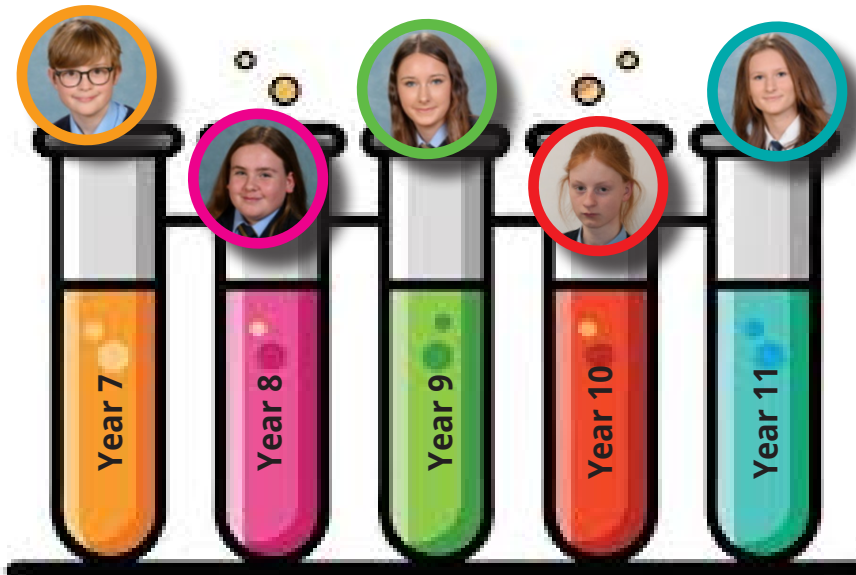
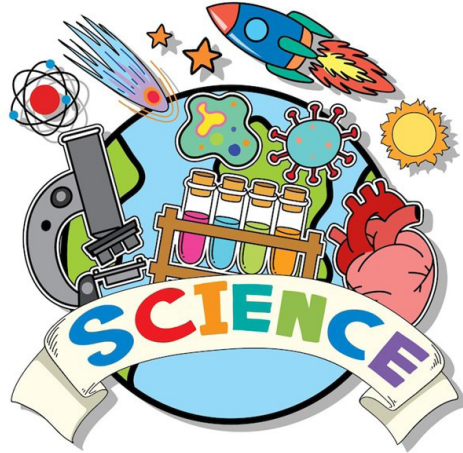

Academic Support & Confidence: Reading to dogs improves literacy skills, including reading accuracy and fluency, as the dog provides a non-judgmental, calming audience.

Increased Attendance & Motivation: The presence of a dog creates a more positive, engaging, and welcoming school environment, which can increase student attendance and willingness to learn.

Responsibility & Empathy: Students learn to care for others, encouraging responsibility and respect for living things. Therapy dogs offer a safe space for students to feel secure and supported, making them a valuable addition to student support services.

SECONDARY DRAMA SHOWCASE



On Wednesday 28 January 2026, 20 of our GCSE Drama students took part in the Secondary Drama Showcase at the Hall For Cornwall. We were given the brief of 'Kernow Rising' back in October and after some discussion and exploration work, we settled on adapting the old legend of Cormoran the giant but giving it a contemporary update. Cormoran became a 'giant' building corporation intent on knocking down a much loved engine house to build a 5* hotel. The villagers revolt and eventually win due to the discovery that the choughs are nesting there.

The challenge was that we were only permitted 7 minutes performance time to tell our story through theatre! We overcame this with stylised use of space and scene changes, stereotype characters and a dream sequence. Once again the Creative Arts Faculty pulled out all the stops with a fantastic chough puppet and 20 chough masks for the dream sequence created by Ms Chapman and Ms Wildor. The HFC tech team commented on the impressive

quality of these during our tech rehearsal! Also, Mr Semmons our technician created a fabulous animation of an engine house and choughs flying which was projected onto the cyclorama and really made the dream sequence atmospheric and clear.

The students were amazing on the day. They were professional, alert, confident, supportive of each other and focused through the tech rehearsal and performance. We were also lucky enough to have a Q and A session with a director and producer for the HFC and a great workshop on acting skills. After their amazing performance, the student were able to see the work of 8 other schools which is always both interesting and inspiring.

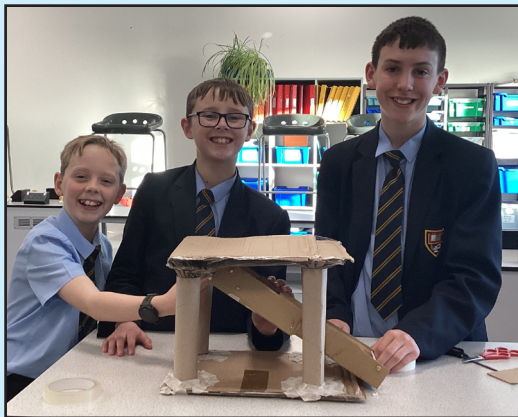

The students in Science club have been building their marble run, to enable them to investigate the factors affecting the speed of the marble. At present, we have one layer with a pin ball slope completed. The next layer was prepared this week and will be added the previous layer after half term. The marble run will be a combination of a self-standing tiered structure and a number of pipe rolls running along the wall. The students are using both design and engineering skills in the building phase and will then use their scientific analysis skills when measuring the speed of the marble. This will be followed by some mathematical calculations of speed, which will complete the full STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) package. The students are enjoying the challenge and I am listening to some excellent problem solving conversations, whilst supervising a very student-led project. Great work team!

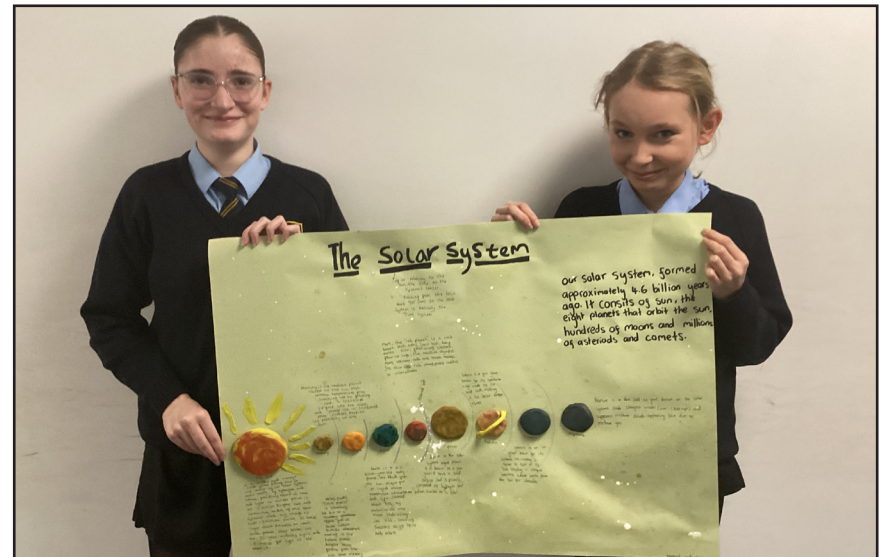
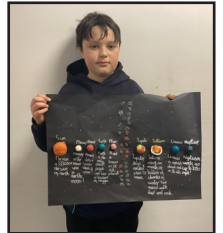

OUR SOLAR SYSTEM

Year 8 students have been learning about Space and Forces in their recent Science lessons. With the use of the iPads they independently researched the planets and other celestial objects that make up our Solar system, using this information to produce fact file posters to display. With Mrs Mullins, students in 8Sc.p were able to use playdough to create 3D versions of the planets, mixing the clay to give the correct colour and adding in rings, asteroids, comets, and moons.

Savannah B and Elsie G worked amazingly well together to produce the most informative poster in the class. Daniel P worked with great effort and determination to produce an independent poster in a single lesson. Well done.





Ask the Experts: Hospitality

Terri Felton-Munday and Caleb Munday from Mousehole Deli attended to meet with interested students from Years 10-13. Terri and Caleb started by giving students an overview of their career journey to date. This resonated with students who gained a greater appreciation that journeys towards future careers can take many twists and turns along the way. Next, our guests answered questions posed by our students which included content on the best ways to access and make progress in hospitality careers. One of the valuable pieces of information was that students were encouraged to meet with providers, e.g. chefs, restaurant owners etc, as employers as more likely to employ young people that take the initiative to come to introduce themselves. Students finished the session encouraged, motivated and grateful for the opportunity to find out more about the hospitality industry.



Ask the Experts: Law

Chris Morse from Stephens Scown Solicitors inspired students interested in careers in Law. Chris gave details of his career path and

how his role has changed during the eighteen years he has been with the company. Students were given an insight into the different routes into Law careers and were encouraged to carry out their own research/voluntary projects to gain further experience that would set themselves apart from others who apply for law-related roles. Chris explained clearly the difference in a range of roles and also the benefits and pressures/expectations associated. The session was of great interest to the students present and has no doubt inspired some to continue their career journey following a role in law.



Xello Careers Lessons

All students in Years 7-11 were introduced to the Careers platform Xello in the Autumn term. Year 7 students were the first to use Xello to complete their PSHE work on the topic: Living in the wider world. Lessons included the topics: School subjects at work; Interests; and Time Management. This has helped to prepare and inform students towards identifying their strengths ahead of mapping their future career path.

Other year groups are working through their Xello careers lessons during the spring term. The topics covered are:

Year 8 = Discover Learning Pathways; Learning Styles; Biases and Career Choices.

Year 9 = Skills; Explore Career Matches; Self-advocacy, Choosing your KS4 options.

Year 10 = Getting experience; Personality styles; Study skills and habits.

Year 11 = Work values; Workplace skills and attitudes; Transition to Further Education.



Year 9 Careers Carousel Options event

In mid January all Year 9 students were given the chance to meet with industry experts from a wide range of sectors and local further education and apprenticeship providers. Students in pairs were able to find out how their skills and interests matched with a variety of careers. They were given five minutes to ask and answer questions with our visitors and make notes using their iPads before moving on to the next presenter. As well as the benefits of learning about careers students were able to develop their interpersonal skills by conversing with guests they had not met before. The feedback received from students about this experience was overwhelmingly positive with many now with a clearer idea about the opportunities available to them in their futures, and guidance towards which subjects to consider choosing for their options to fit their careers ideas. Our visiting guests were very complementary about the attitude and engagement of the Year 9 students, with many students using this as an opportunity to enquire about work experience opportunities for when they are in Year 10.



Future Skills Questionnaires

During this term all students in Years 7-10 have had the chance to complete a Future Skills Questionnaire (FSQ). These are important as it helps the student to share their level of awareness and confidence in careers-related learning. It also indicates where they need further support so they are knowledgeable about the opportunities available to them. Students who have been unable to complete these so far can collect their unique questionnaire link from their form tutor.

Careers Open Evening

Following the success of the Year 9 options event, our guests stayed after school to meet with interested students from Years 9, 10 & 11. This was in an informal setting where there was no fixed agenda or time schedule for our experts to discuss careers options with students accompanied by their parents. Year 9 students welcomed the chance to meet with additional people who they didn't link with earlier in the day, and Year 10 and 11s were able to gain an understanding of the Post 16 options available to them including apprenticeships, A-levels and Vocational courses. There was a great atmosphere created with many students happy that they were now better informed regarding their future options.



Apprenticeship Expo

A range of local and National apprenticeship providers visited to Helston Community College to raise awareness of opportunities available to students from age 16 and 18. Year 11 students met with experts during their period 4 lesson and took advantage of the time to find out about application procedures and the make-up of the training and work schedule across the duration of the apprenticeship.



Apprenticeship Evening

After the Year 11s met with apprenticeship providers during period 4, many returned to the Post 16 centre to carry on their conversations after college. In addition, Year 12 and 13 students could attend with parents to ask questions in an informal setting. Many students took advantage of the opportunity to become better aware and informed about the Post 16 and Post 18 options available to them both locally and nationally. National Apprenticeship Week 9th-15th February

Students in Years 7-9 were able to learn more about Apprenticeships through an online presentation delivered by Maria Mason from Schools Outreach Company. Maria ensured students knew about the wide range of career sectors which promote apprenticeships and made students aware of the benefits of both apprenticeships and going to university. Year 7-9 students were given a research task for homework to find out about the range of apprenticeships available in curriculum areas around the school. In addition, they were given the chance to access apprenticeship webinars to find out more opportunities in careers that they find appealing.

Ask the Experts: Technology. - Monday 23 March.

Robert Wiltshire from Tech Cornwall will be attending to give students an insight into careers in what is a growth sector in the UK.

Ask the Experts: Aviation - Monday 20 April.

Chloe Taylor and Mr Thorpe will be representing Ascent Flight Training, who are based at Culdrose. A chance to find out about entry requirements and content of courses linked with flying and aviation.

Ask the Experts: University - Wednesday 6 May.

Former Helston Community College student Josh Thomas will be giving his insights into life at university. Josh is currently in his fourth year studying at London School of Economics. This Q&A session could include tips for university life, and insights into the application process. This event has been rearranged from the college closure day in January.

Ask the Experts: Agriculture - Monday 18 May.

Ian Hampton from Skern Training & Skills will present his knowledge and experience of farming and other associated roles. Interested students will be able to ask their own questions to find out about training routes and recommendations for making progress with careers in this industry.

Careers Carousel - Tuesday 10 March - Year 5 & Year 7.

Year 5 students from feeder primary schools around Helston, along with Year 7s from Helston Community College, will have the chance to find out what career opportunities exist linked with their interests and skills. For Year 7 students this will build on from the similar work they have been completing on Xello as part of their careers-related PSHE work. This careers event is likely to feature over 400 students during the course of the day.

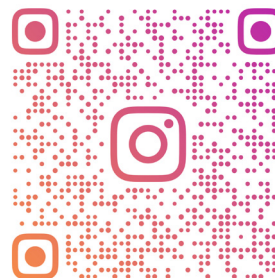

Hayden B has been selected for the Under 15's Exeter Chiefs Foundation Programme after going through trials.

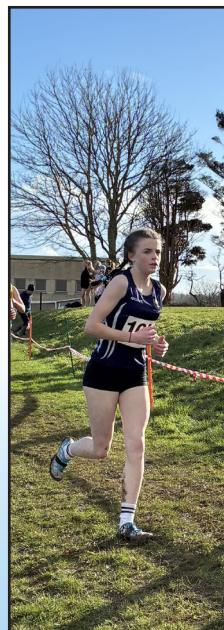
As you can imagine we are extremely proud of Hayden as this is a massive achievement. This is the first step to Hayden's dream of becoming professional in a sport he has so much passion for.

Cornish Pirate Iwan Price-Thomas visits HCC

On the last day of term, we were delighted to welcome Cornish Pirate Iwan Price-Thomas to the College. Iwan is a former Wales U19 and England Students player, who is in his second season at Cornish Pirates RFC.

Iwan met with a group of rugby players from different year groups and talked about his journey through sport and life as a professional rugby player. Iwan explained how welcoming he found people at the Cornish Pirates and how the communities in Cornwall feel very similar to his roots in South Wales.

Our students asked lots of really thoughtful questions. As a result, they learned about the importance of nutrition, the challenges and opportunities that rugby provides, Iwan's experience of playing with/against world-class players such as Louis Rees-Zammit and the values that Iwan feels are crucial to success in sport and life in general. He didn't even blush when students asked him about his GCSE results and how much he earned!

Iwan repeatedly emphasised the importance of resilience – pushing yourself to achieve, accepting that you will have setbacks and persevering for what's important to you. Students were interested to hear how much Iwan's rugby clubs valued his education and his life outside rugby. We even heard how one rugby coach would drop-in to his university lectures to check that his players were attending! We learned that to join a professional club, the focus is often less about a player's rugby skills (which they already know are good) and more about their personal skills – are they polite, hard-working, team players, etc? Iwan explained how important these things were in all walks of life.

Iwan ended his visit by drawing the winners for our end of term Consequence Card Prize Draw – celebrating students who have shown kindness, good manners, or have demonstrated being a good citizen over the last term. This was a great way to finish school before the Christmas break.

We are really grateful to Iwan and the Cornish Pirates for visiting us and look forward to working with them more this year.

THE TONY HIBBERT PRIZE

History Competition

The judges are looking for entries that engage with this theme by students who can link their interest in the history of modern war with the world we live in today and can encourage their audiences to think about the relationship between 20th century conflict and the challenges the world faces today.

Judges will award marks based on:

- Engagement with the theme
- Creativity in approach – innovative angle on the content, original interpretation of the theme, challenging preconceptions/misconceptions
- Content – clear, accurate, imaginative, and informative
- Effective communication – presented and communicated in an engaging way
- A passion for history and its present-day relevance
- Proper acknowledgement of any sources used

The deadline for the competition is 12.00pm on Friday 24 April 2026.

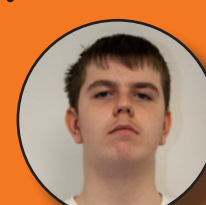

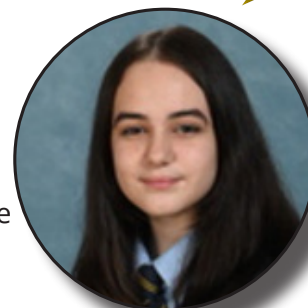

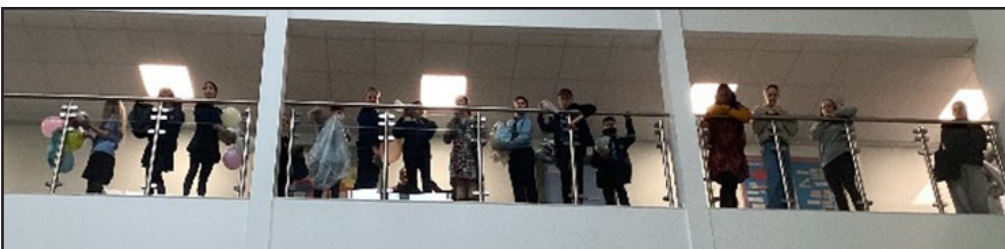
We also have the Year 8 Parent Teacher Consultation on Thursday 12th March. I look forward to seeing you all there to celebrate the students' achievements.

Some students may be apprehensive as to whether they have been allocated their choices. Please reassure them that the College will do its best and as soon as we are ready we will get in touch to confirm. If they need to have a chat about their concerns, please ask them to pop in and see me. Our Student Leaders have been taking part in a fundraiser for Year 7. The aim was to both build a connection between the youngest in the College and raise some money for the British Heart Foundation. In preparation for the expectations of Key Stage 4 I would like to focus on homework and preparation for the end of module tests. You will have been reminded elsewhere but could you please ensure that your child has clean unpainted nails ready for the first day back after the half term. For some this may require booking appointments to have unsuitable gel nails removed. The same applies for restocking pencil case items and ensuring that they have their iPads fully charged for the first day back. The sessions were informative and incredibly valuable in supporting students' understanding of the risks and realities they may encounter. I was proud of how respectfully and thoughtfully the year group engaged with the workshop. Their behaviour was exemplary and the questions they asked showed real maturity and curiosity.

UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE FROM COLLEGE

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period.

Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting

order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend Court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the Government.

'Parent' as set out in Section 576 of the Education Act 1996, defines

parent to include: natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person or body who has parental responsibility for a child (as defined by the Children Act 1989) and; any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child. Having care of a child means a person with whom a child lives and who looks after a child, irrespective of what their relationship is with said child.

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you consider that your request for absence is exceptional, please complete the form on the College website.

A response from the school will be sent to you as soon as possible. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

ATTENDANCE

I know you have had a number of messages about the importance of attendance over the academic year. However, we just want to reiterate what the impact of being in school every day has on students. The data is really clear - students with high attendance (95%+) on average achieve more than those with low attendance. This is not just the case with assessments and exams, but also in respect of the wider aspects of school life, such as developing social skills and friendships; being involved in leadership roles or extra-curricular activities.

We do, of course, understand that everyone gets ill at times, but when illness is minor, we do expect students to be resilient and make every effort to come in. If they are too unwell to remain in school, they can be sent home. Being resilient is an important part of growing up and an important part of life generally. Please do support us in trying to develop this in the students.

As you know, we are unable to authorise term-time holidays. We can do so in exceptional circumstances; however these really are very rare. The direction and guidance from the government is very clear so please be prepared to receive a penalty notice should you choose to take your child out of school during term.

We run a tiered approach to supporting students' attendance. If attendance starts to become a concern, the student will be placed at tier 1 and you will be notified in writing. This is a supportive measure to see if there is anything we can do to improve the situation. However, should the attendance continue to decline, then a student will be placed on tier 2, where a Pupil Support Plan will be drawn up in collaboration with parents/carers. If all support options have been exhausted and are not successful, then the Education Welfare Officer will take on the case.

We know that every situation is different and there are genuine reasons for absence. We really do want to work with families to help when attendance declines. Please take this as it is meant - we simply want to work together with you to ensure the students in our care get the best out of school, by being in as much as possible.
