Helston Community College's Anti-Bullying Mission Statement

We, the students and staff of Helston Community College, stand united in our quest to deplore all types of bullying and discrimination and any behaviour that encourages it. We aim to provide support and guidance for both victims and perpetrators of bullying as well as sanctioning where necessary, but ultimately to eliminate bullying in its earliest stages in order to ensure all members of our College feel protected.

What is Bullying?

Bullying is repeated negative behaviour that is intended to make others feel upset, uncomfortable or unsafe.

What are the different types of Bullying?

Verbal – The repeated negative use of speech, sign language or verbal gestures to intentionally harm (hurt) others. E.g., swearing, offensive language, discriminatory language.

Indirect – Repeated negative actions which are neither verbal or physical to intentionally hurt others. E.g., isolating someone from a group, damaging/taking somebody's property, physical intimidation.

Physical – Repeated negative use of body contact to intentionally hurt others. E.g., punching, kicking, spitting at someone, pushing, poking, biting, pinching.

Cyberbullying - The use of electronic communication to bully a person. E.g., flaming/trolling, catfishing, outing/exposing, cyber stalking, exclusion, online sexual harassment, denigration.

Sexual – Repeated unwanted physical contact, inappropriate touching, abusive comments, homophobic abuse, exposure to inappropriate films etc.

Anti-Bullying Ambassadors

The Anti-Bullying Ambassadors are a team of students in years 9-11 who have been trained by The Diana Award Anti-Bullying Campaign. Their role is to help educate their peers on bullying, lead on anti-bullying campaigns, promote a culture which celebrates and tolerates differences and help keep their peers safe both online and offline. The programme is designed to equip students and staff with the tools needed to tackle bullying behaviour head on and transform Helston Community College's approach to Anti-Bullying to create a safer, kinder college community. The programme is lead by students, who are leading our campaigns in college.

Since launching the team in September 2022, we have already received a number of positive feedback including in our recent Ofsted report.

The relationships between staff and pupils are very strong. Pupils feel cared for and well supported. Pupils state that bullying is rare and staff resolve it when it occurs. The anti-bullying and kindness ambassadors are very well organised and support pupils if they have any concerns.

How do Anti-Bullying Ambassadors educate on Bullying in College and the Community?

At Helston Community College, we the Anti-Bullying Ambassadors take Bullying seriously. We educate our peers through several different ways. At the beginning of the school academic year, we go into Year Group Assemblies and outline that we do not tolerate any form of bullying in our college to remind students not to bully and tell them the consequences of their actions. We are also educating on bullying by hosting events like Odd Sock Day, as well as having Parents/carers Bullying Awareness sessions, so parents and carers know how to help and support their child if any bullying situation arises. We are also presenting presentations to local primary schools to try and educate them from a younger age that bullying is not acceptable and when they arrive at Helston Community College, they know that it is not acceptable. We have even more ideas and have weekly meetings to discuss any further projects and events. Who to contact if you or someone else is being bullied?

At Helston Community College, all staff members have undergone thorough Anti-Bullying Training, and know how to respond and deal with bullying situations. We have a wide range of student support from the Pastoral Support Assistants and Champions whose purpose is to make sure students are well and are happy both inside school and out. As well as our Anti-Bullying Ambassadors who are available every lunchtime in **Meeting Room 1 on South Site** to help support students who are experiencing bullying behaviours.

E-Safety

We believe that as students at Helston Community College, we need to know the knowledge, skills and tools to understand and harshness the power of the Internet. When you use the Internet in school, you and your parents can be assured that through our security and filtering technologies, your browsing will be safe and secure. However, when you are browsing the Internet at home, things may not be as safe and secure.

Make sure you know the **SMART** rules:

- **S SAFE**: To keep safe online, don't give out your personal information full name, email address, phone number, home address or school.
- **M MEETING**: Meeting someone you have met online can be dangerous. Only meet if your parents or carers agree and they can be with you.
- A ACCEPTING: Accepting emails and messages from people you don't know can be risky, especially if they have attachments they can contain viruses or nasty messages.
- **R RELIABLE**: Information you find on the internet may not be reliable, and people may not be who they say they are.
- **T TELL**: Tell your parent, carer, anti-bullying ambassador, or an adult you trust if something makes you feel worried or if you know someone is being bullied online.

If you are concerned about something that may have happened while online, you can now report it to the Child Exploitation and Online Protection Centre. You are doing the right thing and by taking this action you may not only help yourself but also help make other people safer as well.

If you are being bullied online, please contact a key team member above who will get in touch with a matter of urgency to discuss your concern further, or you can talk to a member of the Anti-Bullying Ambassadors who are trained to deal with online bullying. We also have introduced the Kindness Ambassadors (Years 7 & 8) whose job it is to promote kindness and positivity to their dedicated year groups and the college. They also work alongside the Anti-Bullying Ambassadors to help promote that bullying is not acceptable.




Anti-Bullying Ambassadors Awareness Journey
