DfE publishes Draft (September 2019) Keeping Children Safe in Education (KCSiE)



Draft - Keeping children safe in education

Statutory guidance for schools and colleges

For information, this guidance will be published on 7 September 2019 and will replace KCSiE 2016 and its amendments. Until then schools and colleges must continue to have regard to KCSiE 2016.

Annex H summarises the changes.

Schools will need to:

Ensure policies are updated
Ensure staff have read, understood and can apply the new guidance
Annex A—new paragraph added to acknowledge that ‘upskirting’ is now a criminal offence.
Annex C—link added to new DfE guidance Teaching Online Safety in school

Education for a Connected World

The UK Council for Child Internet Safety (UKCCIS) has produced a framework to equip children and young people for digital life. **Use this document in conjunction with the DfE’s ‘Teaching Online Safety in school’.**

The framework breaks down ‘online safety’ into **eight** aspects and provides guidance on what a child should know in terms of current online technology, and the skills they need to be able to navigate them according to age.

DfE Guidance—Teaching Online Safety in School

Applicable to all local authority maintained schools, academies and free schools.

The non-statutory guidance **Teaching online safety in school** (DfE, June 2019) outlines to schools the importance of helping children and young people to use the internet safely and to also provide them with opportunities to learn how to behave online, highlighting the importance of teaching developmentally and age appropriateness.



The guidance includes the following underpinning knowledge and behaviours:

- How to evaluate what they see online
- How to recognise techniques used for persuasion
- Online behaviour
- How to identify online risks
- How and when to seek support

The guidance emphasises the need for a whole school approach so that it is embedded in everything the school does including:

Creating a culture that incorporates the principles of online safety across all elements of school life
Proactively engaging staff, pupils and parents/carers
Reviewing and maintaining the online safety principles
Embedding the online safety principles
Modelling the online safety principles consistently
