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**Puzzle 2: Anachronisms**

An anachronism is something that doesn't fit into a time period – it didn't come along until afterwards, or was around much earlier. A knight in metal armour walking down a modern high street using a mobile phone would be a good example of an anachronism

Being able to spot anachronisms shows you have what historians call 'a sense of period' – you can imagine what a moment in the past might look like and have a good timeline in your head to spot what might be out of place.

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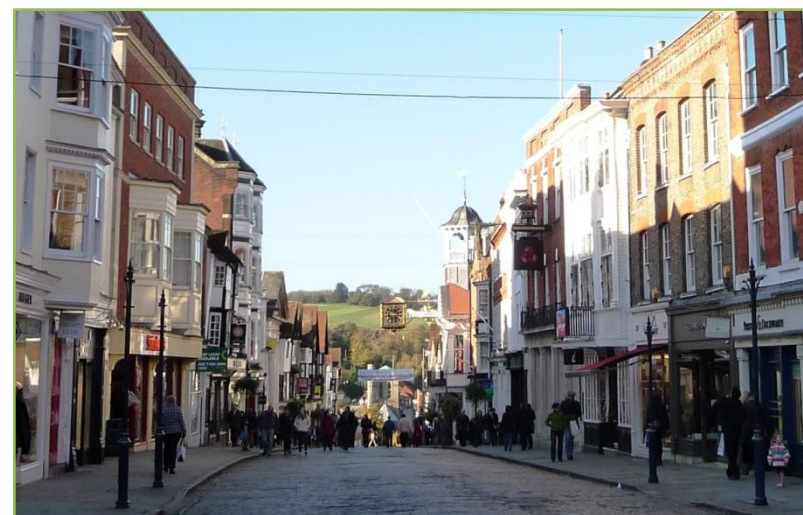
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
